Course Overview

This course offers a systematic approach to the study of Middle Eastern Politics. It includes a wide range of topics, including the formation and consolidation of authoritarian rule in contemporary Middle Eastern states, election and party systems, the political economy of the region, the political impact of oil, the prospect of democracy, role of religion, and recent developments such as the Arab Spring. The class offers an overview of current Middle Eastern politics and seeks to provide a case-based approach to lay out the empirical evidence regarding the politics of the region's individual countries.

Course objectives:

At the end of the course, students are expected to be able to;

- Understand the modern Middle Eastern politics by determining the historical, social, political, cultural factors
- Understand the region and the politics of individual countries in the region based on theoretical and empirical evidence
- Understand the interaction between regional politics and global politics.

Assignments:

- 1. Map Quiz: Student will be asked about the countries, the important geographical shapes, and the regions in the Middle East.
- <u>2.</u> <u>Opinion (Summary) Paper</u>: Each student will summarize Stephen Kinzer's *All the Shah's Men* with his/her opinions (3 pages).
- 3. <u>Country Report:</u> Each student needs to select a country from the region and analyze its domestic politics, economic system and its relations with other regional states and its importance for the region. Each student is required to write a short paper (3 pages).
- 4. Analytical Paper and Presentation: Each student needs to select a topic from the class materials such as (social movements, democracy, Islam, conflict, oil) and apply it to a regional state and write a short paper (5-7 pages). S/he needs to present his or her findings in five-minutes in class presentation starting from Week 10.

Further details about the assignments will be discussed and documentation about the country report and analytical paper will be given to students in class on January 23rd, 2017. There will be a signup sheet in this class to select countries, topics and presentation dates.

Exams: The exams will cover material presented in the lectures, textbooks, visual materials, and any assigned outside readings. Each of the two exams will consist of multiple-choice and true/false questions. If you must miss an exam, please contact me before the date of the exam. The format of the make-up exam (multiple choice, short answer, or essay) is left to the discretion of the instructor. NOTE: If you miss an exam and fail to contact me before the date of the exam, this behavior will result in a ZERO for that exam.
